Noorunissa Inayat Khan, eldest child of beloved Sufi teacher Hazrat Inayat Khan, is honored as a WWII hero by France and England for her crucial work as an underground radio operator for the French Resistance. She was captured, tortured, and killed by the Nazis when she was 30 years old. All contributions will be used by the Memorial Trust to erect a permanent monument to Noor in London. She will be the first Indian woman to be honored by Britain in this way.



Latifa Noor Elizabeth Anderson is an improvising cellist and vocalist who has performed throughout the United States, Austrailia, Italy, Germany, Finland, Israel, Japan and India. As cellist of the Meliora Quartet she was winner of the Naumburg Award and she currently performs with the New York City Opera at Lincoln Center. She has created a CD of original improvisations for cello, voice and tamboura, titled Latifa Noor. As a recording artist she has recorded for Telarc, Nonesuch, and RCA.

Ananda Eric Pritchard, violinist, enjoys an active career as a classical performer and supporting musician for the Dances of Universal Peace. The winner of the National Federation of Music Clubs Award in Violin, he has performed as

soloist with many orchestras in the United States including the Boston Pops and the Indianapolis Philharmonic as well as with orchestras in Europe and South America. As the First Violinist of the Ciompi Quartet he appears on chamber music series throughout the United States and Europe and serves on the faculty of Duke University. He holds degrees from Indiana University and the Juilliard School.

Stephen Smith began composing music to Hazrat Inayat Khan's poetry in the late seventies. His first recording of Inayat Khan's poetry, Promise of the Dawn (1980), was a collaboration with Dilwara Fletcher and Shams Kairys with original compositions by all three performers. He studied classical piano, jazz piano, and

composition at Berklee College of Music, and classical composition and piano at City College of San Francisco.

Jon Seskevich is an award-winning nurse clinician at Duke University who has been leading universal chanting for many years in the Triangle and beyond.

Jewelsong is an eclectic women's vocal ensemble who share the joy of music through inspirational songs from many different spiritual traditions. Betsy Bickel, Farrunnissa Rosa, Marilyn Grubbs, and Sofianna Solem have been musicians most of their lives and have been singing together since 2002. They have composed and/or arranged most of their songs and they sing regularly at faith gatherings around the Triangle.
