SIZER'S  
INSTALLATION

I was the prep, you were the Big Seniors, and I annoyed you by asking you to stop the practice of "prepping". I'm grateful, though, that even some of you who disagreed with me on this matter either eventually understood my reasoning or accepted it, and moved ahead.

Any first year at Andover is tough, and mine was no exception. You were the earliest candid colleagues: it is difficult in a wholly unfamiliar surrounding to elicit the reaction necessary to gauge one's actions. The media men helped more than they knew with their friendly, "Well, you blew that one . . .", conclusions. (Occasionally, too, I did something right, and they happily were quick to note that too.)

Of course, an absence of prepping (at least as the form of exploitation that I saw it to be) and the presence of friendly candor contribute to that subtle, but crucial tone of a school—or any community, for that matter. Without a feeling of support and understanding, without humor, and without that desirable irreverence especially essential in our kind of competitive serious community, the Academy isn't worth attending. Happily, I saw all these characteristics in abundance (though the school *could* well laugh more at itself). In spite of the overuse of the abused word, "trust", the tone of Andover was relatively open and positive during your senior year—and most of the credit for this rests with the class of '73.

Yearbooks traditionally look backward: this is the way we were, our school was. They might better look forward. Andover is called (alas) a "prep" school—but preparatory to what? College? Being grown up? Life? The World of Work?

I cannot speak for what you'll be; I can speak for what I would like to be and what I hope Andover becomes. The latter only is relevant here.

Why must Andover be an all-embracing institution, trying to provide a "complete" experience? As I perceive it, we do some things well. Why not concentrate on these, and allow—urge—students to attend several schools, this one and others, of varying types, as seems best for each individual over the several years between ages thirteen and nineteen? The notion that a single institution can be a microcosm of society, or can purvey the whole range of learning necessary for the "real business of living" is as arrogant as it is unreachable. I see a future Andover as an important segment of a student's secondary education, but not its whole. It is only part of the "preparation".

The America of 1973—the living now—had wants and strains, none more corrosive than its fearfulness. The late '60s and early '70s shattered our optimism. "Living now" was an act too often of cynicism, a despair, or dropping out. To give in to such is neither humane living nor good preparation.

Our fear had much to do with the fear of strangers, of people different from ourselves, racially, sexually, ethnically. Andover can stand against this by being diverse, by allowing, indeed encouraging, a student and faculty from many quarters, with many ideas and ideals. Perhaps Andover could be a truly pluralist school. As such, it would make for happier living now—and teach the fact that *homo sapiens* has little to fear, and much to love, among its own number.

Of course, one should address our fear directly. We infrequently do. Rarely here do the questions of death, or of cruelty, or of personal inadequacy, get asked, save to our most private selves. One debates "parietals" rather than either the parallel realities of the joys and the dangers of physical intimacy or the meaning of simple human friendships. We seek advice only on our presumed successes, not on our known weaknesses.

Candor can hurt as often as help. Yet the possibility for open honesty must be available for any to take place, and it must be open at Andover not only at Isham and Cochran, but everywhere.

Of course, these hopes are contradictory, a decline in "fear" to allow for greater candor, (thus both happiness "now" and relevant "preparation") will come only when the Andover community is more homogeneous, in the sense that it is more accepting overall of the values of openness. Yet we also need this community to be heterogeneous: we need diversity, not only of geography and income, but also of ideas and ideals.

The contradiction here makes Andover an interesting place. (The contradiction is present everywhere, of course: it is the spinal cord of American political philosophy). Can we be a fearless community and still be a pluralistic?

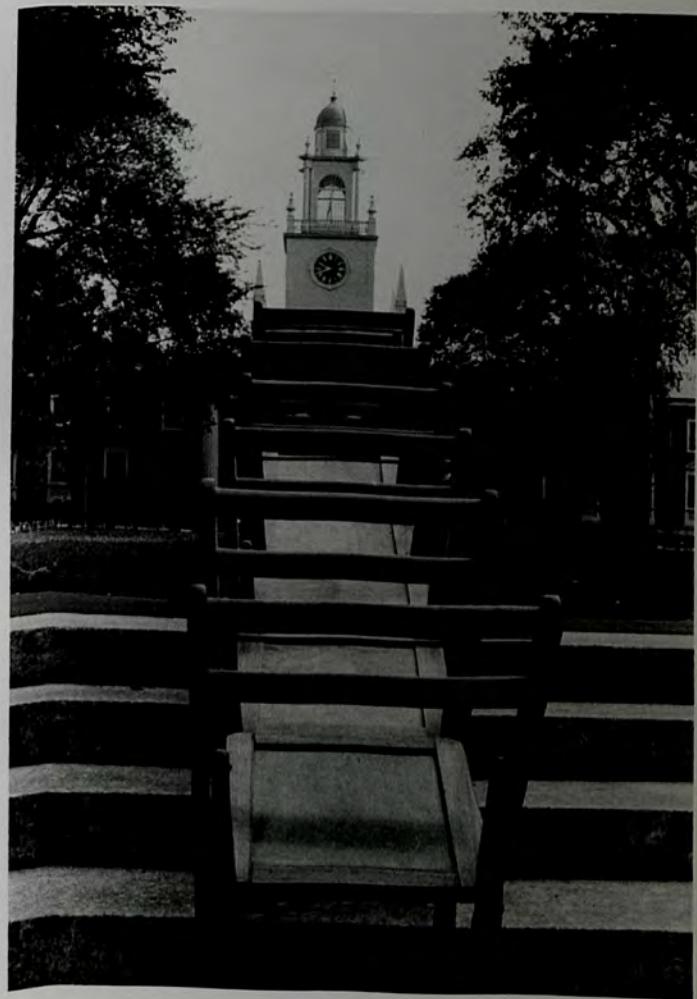
I trust the answer can be yes. The class of '73 should properly judge the school on its future progress toward this achievable utopia.

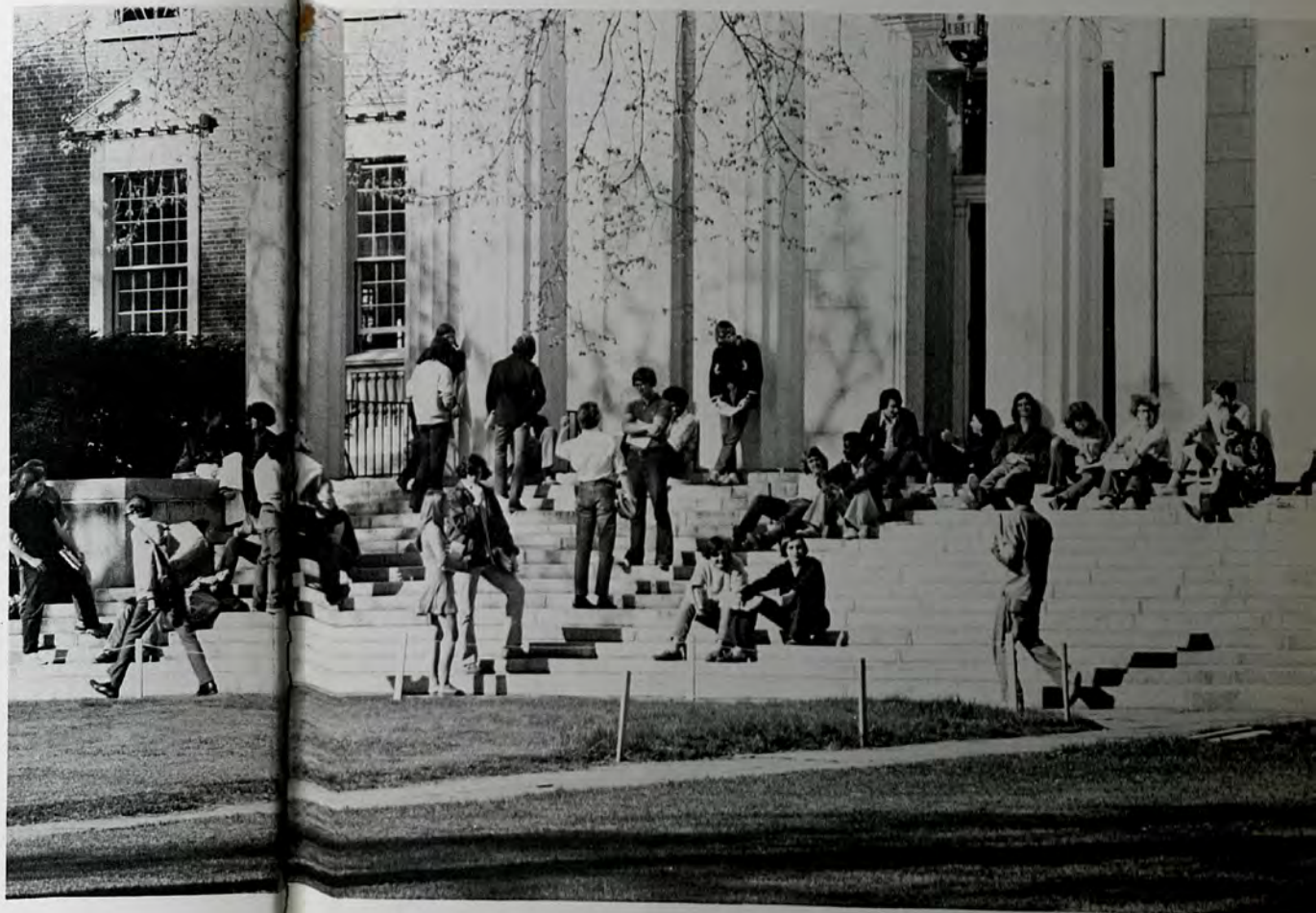

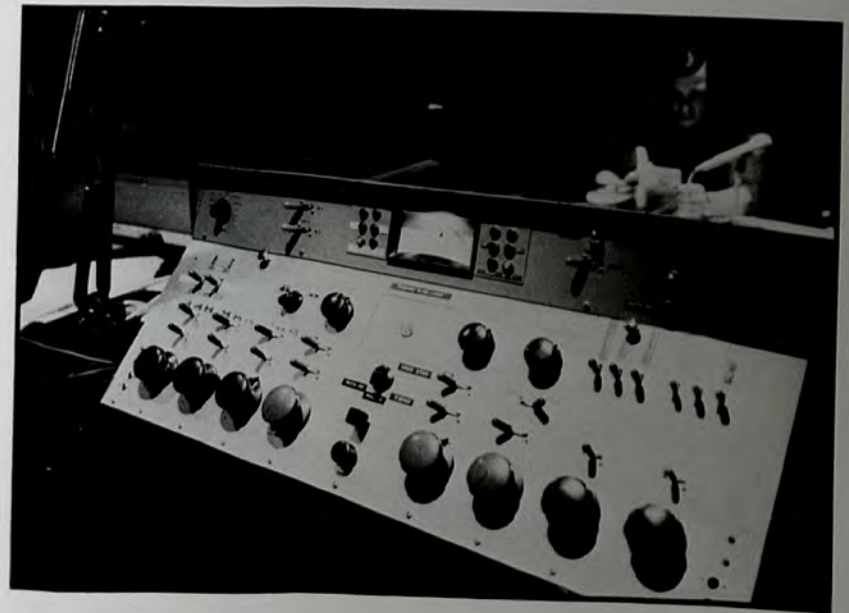
I can't help feeling that our life on the Phillipian—it was consuming—shaped the way we developed at PA more than any other single influence.

black numbered doors 10, 11, 12.

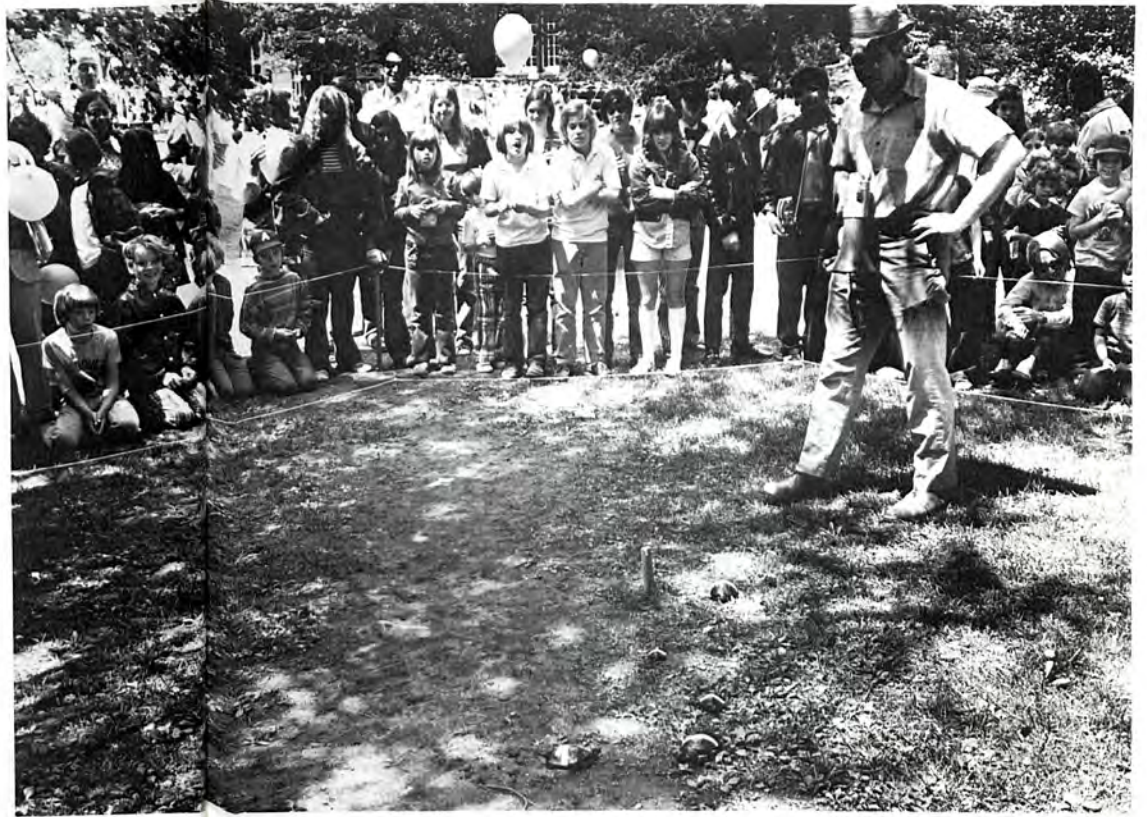

Caffeinated nights stretched the resiliency of friendships. Stereotyping, roleplaying . . . discussions concerning change took on the wan form of cliché. Sensitivity lapsed into boredom. There was doubt, a wavering. For we too were groping in tumult for definitions, a concrete identity. The becoming meant anxiety, periodical irresolution, frustration.

But then, spring. The change was startling. At Abbot the thought of year's end strengthened our sorority, and friendships that survived winter now bloomed. Then too, we struck a better solidarity with Phillips. Pressure was down and Phillips had defrosted. Despite remaining disputes, the rapport was livelier and—yes, less stereotyped. Plans for the following year were being implemented with more rapidity. Yet spring had rejuvenated our optimism—in ourselves as individuals, in Abbot to provide a new source for the Andover community of warmth, gentleness, and perhaps too, a sense of humor. Abbot offered Phillips a wisdom too seldom sought—an understanding of failure, of patience, of the value of compassion.

We graduated from Abbot exercising those very elements, looking forward to the future, both our own and that of our new school.

It has always been fashionable for students to criticize Andover, if not as an experience then as an institution.
